# **Powering On the Projector**

- 1. Remove the lens cap. 0
- Securely connect the power cord and signal cable. When connected, the Power LED will flash blue.
- 3. Turn on the projector by pressing " ∪ " button on the control panel. The Power LED will turn blue. ②
- 4. Turn on your source that you want to display on the screen (computer, note-book, video player, etc). The projector will detect the source automatically and will display on the screen.
- 5. If you connected multiple sources at the same time, press the "Source" button to switch between inputs.



# **Powering Off the Projector**

1. Press the "  $\circlearrowleft$  " button on the control panel to turn off the projector. The following message will be displayed on the screen.



Press the " U " button again to confirm.

You can also turn off the projector by pressing the **Power OFF** button on the remote control.

2. It is now safe to unplug the power cord.

# **Adjusting the Projector's Height**


The projector is equipped with elevator foot for adjusting the image height.

• To raise the image:

Use screw in foot to raise the image to the desired height angle and fine-tune the display angle.  $oldsymbol{0}$ 


To lower the image:

Use screw in foot to lower the image to the desired height angle and fine-tune the display angle.  ${\bf 2}$ 



## Adjusting the Projector's Focus

To focus the image, rotate the focus ring until the image is clear.



# **Adjusting Projection Image Size**

### How to optimize screen size and distance

Consult the table below to find the optimal screen sizes achievable when the projector is positioned at a desired distance from the screen. Example: If the projector is 2.5 m from the screen, good image quality is possible for image sizes between 63" and 75".




Figure: Fixed distance with different zoom and screen size.




■ Follow the figure, the space of 109 cm height is required when located at 2.5 m distance.

## How to get a preferred screen size by adjusting distance and zoom



The table below shows how to achieve a desired screen size by adjusting either

the position or the zoom ring. For example: to obtain an image size of 60" set the projector at a distance 2.0 m and 2.4 m from the screen and adjust the zoom level accordingly.





## How to operate

- When OSD is displayed, use the ◀► buttons to select any item in the main menu. While making a selection on a particular page, press the ▼ button to enter sub menu.
- Use the ▲▼ buttons to select the desired item and adjust the settings by the
   ◆► buttons.
- 4. If the setting has ♣ icon, you could press the ▶ button to enter another sub menu. Press the "Menu" button to close the sub menu after adjustment.
- 5. After adjusting the settings, press the "Menu" button to go back to the main menu.
- 6. To exit, press the "Menu" button again. The OSD menu will be closed and the projector will automatically save the new settings.



#### Color Mode

There are many factory presets optimized for various types of images. Use the ◀ or ▶ button to select the item.

- Bright: Maximum brightness from PC input.
- Presentation: Good color and brightness from PC input.
- ▶ Standard: Suitable for computer or notebook display (VGA signal preferred).
- Theater: Suitable for home theater.
- Dark Room: Suitable for watching movies in a dark room (Video signal preferred).
- Game: Increase the brightness and response time level for enjoying video games.
- Sport: Use high contrast display for clear-cut images ideal for viewing sports events.
- User1 / User2: User defined settings.

# <u>Brightness</u>

Adjust the brightness of the image.

- ▶ Press the ◀ button to darken image.
- ▶ Press the ▶ button to lighten the image.

## Contrast

The contrast controls the degree of difference between the lightest and the darkest parts of the picture. Adjusting the contrast changes the amount of black and white in the image.

- ▶ Press the ■ button to decrease the contrast.
- ▶ Press the ▶ button to increase the contrast.

## Color Temp.

Adjust the color temperature. At higher temperature, the screen looks colder; at lower temperature, the screen looks warmer. Use the ◀ or ▶ button to select the item. To manually set the setting, press ◄ to enter the submenu. Refer to page 27.

### Color Management


Change the intensity of the colors. Press  $\triangleleft$  to enter the submenu. Refer to page 28.

### <u>Gamma</u>

Affects the representation of dark scenery. With greater gamma value, dark scenery looks brighter.

- ▶ Press the ◀ button to decrease gamma.
- ▶ Press the ▶ button to increase gamma.

- Select "User" if you want to customize the color temperature settings.

# **Image Problems**

# ? No image appears on-screen

- ▶ Ensure all the cables and power connections are correctly and securely connected as described in the "Installation" section.
- ▶ Ensure the pins of connectors are not crooked or broken.
- ▶ Check if the projection lamp has been securely installed.
- Make sure you have removed the lens cap and the projector is switched on.

# Partial, scrolling or incorrectly displayed image

- ▶ Press the "◄" (left direction) button on the control panel, or the "Auto Sync" button on the remote control to auto synchronizing for the analog PC signal.
  - If you are using a PC:
    - For Windows 95, 98, 2000, XP, Windows 7:
      - 1. Open the "My Computer" icon, the "Control Panel" folder, and then double click on the "Display" icon.
      - 2. Select the "Settings" tab.
      - 3. Verify that your display resolution setting is lower than or equal to 1080p.
      - 4. Click on the "Advanced Properties".
    - For Windows Vista:
      - 1. From the "My Computer" icon, open the "Control Panel" folder, and double click the "Appearance and Personalization"
      - 2. Select "Personalization".
      - Click "Adjust screen resolution" to display "Display Settings". Click on the "Advanced Settings".

- If the projector is still not projecting the whole image, you will also need to change the monitor display you are using. Refer to the following steps.
  - 1. Select the "Change" under the "Monitor" tab.
  - Click on "Show all devices". Next, select "Standard monitor types" under the SP box; choose the resolution mode you need under the "Models" box.
  - 3. Verify that the resolution setting of the monitor display is lower than or equal to 1080p.

# ? The image is stretched when displaying 16:9 DVD title

When you play anamorphic DVD or 16:9 DVD, the projector will show the best image in 16: 9 format on projector side.

- If you play 4:3 format DVD title, please change the format as 4:3 in projector OSD.
- ▶ If the image is still stretched, you will also need to setup the display format as 16:9 (wide) aspect ratio type on your DVD player.

# Image is too small or too large

- ▶ Move the projector closer to or further from the screen.
- Press "Menu" on the control panel. Go to "SETTING" --> "Aspect Ratio" and try the different settings.

# Image has slanted sides:

- If possible, reposition the projector so that it is centered on the screen and below the bottom of the screen.




